



On the morning of Pentecost everyone heard a big noise from heaven.




At the same time, something like flames of fire stood over everyone.


Peter and John were on their way to the temple to pray. As they got near to the gate called 'Beautiful', they heard a man asking for money.

Peter and John said to the man, 'Look at us!'







Everyone was amazed. A crowd began to gather.

'God has been telling us through the prophets that Jesus would come to bless us and turn us from our wicked ways. He has called us to repent from our sins and be forgiven.'







The next morning, the High Priest and the leaders asked Peter and John, 'Who has given you the power to heal this man?'



When Ananias heard Peter say this, he fell down dead. The young men came and carried him out and buried him.




About three hours later Sapphira, his wife, came to the apostles. She did not know what had happened to her husband.


Peter asked her, 'Did you sell your land for this much money?'

The apostles went about telling everyone of God's wonderful kingdom.


The Holy Spirit had given them the power to do this and also to heal.

He opened the prison doors. He took the apostles out and said to them, 'Go back to the temple and tell the people about this new life.'


That is what the apostles did.

The Captain and his men brought the apostles from the temple and made them stand before the Jewish leaders.


The High Priest said to them, 'We told you not to teach about Jesus. You are turning the people against us.'

'The Holy Spirit has shown us that these things are true. Also, to all who obey Jesus, God has given His Spirit.'




When the Jewish leaders heard this they were so angry that they wanted to kill the apostles.

Everyone was happy with this plan and they chose Stephen, Philip and five others.




God blessed Stephen.

Some Jews hated what Stephen was doing.


They argued with him, but God's Spirit was with Stephen. He spoke wisely to them but they became more angry.



Then they laid their hands on them as they prayed to receive the Holy Spirit.




Simon was watching. He was amazed. He wanted this power.

God's right hand.




The man from Ethiopia believed and when he saw water ahead he said, 'Here is water. What prevents me from being baptised?'



He got some letters from the Chief Priest giving him permission to arrest the Christians in Damascus.





On his way to Damascus Saul was suddenly stopped. There was a great flash of light that made him fall to the ground.

This man is Saul of Tarsus.'


Ananias answered, 'Lord, this man has arrested Christians in Jerusalem. He has come to Damascus to arrest the Christians here.'

and be filled with the Holy Spirit.'


Immediately, something like fish scales fell from his eyes and he could see again.

Saul's life was changed, when the Lord met him on the road to Damascus. He now knew that Jesus was the Son of God.


Saul stopped putting the believers in prison. Instead he stayed with them for several days.





Then he went to the synagogue and told everyone that Jesus truly was the Son of God.

From the scriptures he showed the Jews that Jesus was the Messiah.








Sometime later Saul went to Jerusalem.

speak in the name of Jesus.'


When the Christians heard this they were happy.




Saul, who was later known as Paul, went on telling people about Jesus, the Son of God.



Aeneas got up straight away and walked around.


When the people saw what God had done they believed in the Lord Jesus.

Dorcas became very sick and died. Her friends got her ready for burial and put her body in the room upstairs.






When they reached Joppa, he was taken to where Dorcas's body had been laid.

Cornelius, a Roman officer, loved God and prayed to Him. He also gave money to the poor. He was not of the Jewish people. He was a Gentile.


One afternoon while Cornelius was praying, he saw a vision and heard an angel say, 'Cornelius.'

At the same time, Peter went up onto the roof of the house to pray, and there he saw a vision.


In the vision he saw

reptiles and birds.


Peter heard a voice say, 'Get up, kill and eat.'

Three times this happened. Then the sheet was taken back to heaven.






Peter went to the men and said, 'I am the man you are looking for. What do you want?'

While Peter was still speaking the Holy Spirit came down on all those who were listening.




They praised God for His gift of salvation.


ACTS 12:1-19 AN ANGEL TAKES PETER OUT OF PRISON

'Get dressed and put on your shoes,' said the angel. 'Put on your coat and follow me.'


Peter followed the angel, but he was not sure if it was really happening. He thought it was a dream.
