Nebuchadnezzar said to his officer, 'I want some of these foreigners to be my servants. Choose the young men, who are healthy, good looking and clever.


'Teach them our language and books. Give them the same kind of food and wine as I have. After three years they should be ready to be my servants.'


Daniel said, 'Please, give us a test. For ten days, give us only vegetables and water. At the end of the ten days see what we look like.'



They came to get Daniel and he asked, 'Why is the king in such a hurry?'


Arioch said, 'The king had a dream, but no one can tell him what it means.'

Then Daniel asked his friends, Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, 'Pray to God and ask Him to show us the king's dream to save us.'






In the morning

Daniel said, 'No one could tell you your dream, but there is a God in heaven who knows all things.'







Nebuchadnezzar was angry and said, 'Bring these men to me.'





The king asked Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, 'Is it true that you do not worship my gods or my gold statue?

Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego walked out of the fire. Everyone came close to see them.


The fire had not hurt them.


Their hair and clothes were not burnt

DANIEL 4:1–37 A PROUD TREE CUT DOWN



'The tree you saw in your dream is you.


'You have become very great and powerful.



No one knew what to do.


Then the king's mother said,


'The words you see, are: "Mene, mene, tekel, parsin."





The governors went to the king and said,

King Darius thought it was a good idea and signed the new law.








'Those people who do not want to go back can help by giving things like silver, gold, animals, goods and offerings for the temple.'




Soon there were fifty thousand people including priests, Levites and servants ready to leave for Jerusalem.

His love for Israel goes on for ever.'




So much noise was made that their enemies heard it and came to see what was happening.

They saw God's people praising God.


That was not all.


They saw the foundation of God's new temple.


They did not want these people worshipping God Almighty.



So his helpers went looking everywhere for beautiful ladies and brought them to the palace.




Esther was one of those beautiful ladies taken to the palace.


Esther's wise and godly uncle said to Esther, 'Do not tell anyone that you are one of God's people.'

Now the King had an officer called Haman, who thought he was very important. He loved people bowing to him.




Mordecai found out about Haman's plan to get rid of God's people. He cried and prayed to God.


Esther saw her uncle crying and asked him, 'What are you crying for?'


Mordecai said, 'Haman is going to get rid of us all. Go to the king and ask for his help.'










At dinner the next day, the king asked again, 'Esther, what do you want?'



Nehemiah asked him, 'How is everyone in Jerusalem and what is the city like?'


His brother answered, 'The people have many troubles. The walls of Jerusalem are broken and the gates are burned.'

Nehemiah answered, 'My city, Jerusalem, is in ruins.'


'What do you want?' asked the king.


Nehemiah prayed to God then asked the king, 'If I have pleased you send me to Jerusalem to rebuild the city.'

Nehemiah told him, then asked, 'Would you give me letters to say that I can travel through your land and permission to use wood from your forests?'








The next day he talked to the priests and leaders saying, 'Jerusalem is in a mess.






Nehemiah and the men of Judah kept on building the walls of Jerusalem.


Sanballat and his friends, tried to stop them.

Each family was given a part of the wall to rebuild.






Nehemiah told everyone to be on guard. He gave them swords, spears and bows.
